SOIL HEALTH INSTITUTE

With more than one million organisms in a single teaspoon of Earth, soil is the starting point for plant, animal and human life. It is the foundation for a healthy world.

To ensure that soil continues to be a vital natural resource for generations to come, The Samuel Roberts Noble Foundation and Farm Foundation, NFP, announced the formation of the Soil Health Institute. The Soil Health Institute is an evolution of the Soil Renaissance, an initiative established in 2013 by the Noble Foundation and Farm Foundation to advance soil health and make it the cornerstone of land use management decisions.

The Soil Health Institute's mission is to safeguard and enhance the vitality and productivity of the soil. It will work directly with conventional and organic farmers and ranchers, public- and private-sector researchers, academia, policymakers, government agencies, industry, environmental groups and consumers - everyone who benefits from healthy soils.

The organization will serve as the primary resource for soil health information, working to set soil health standards and measurement, build knowledge about the economics of soil health, offer educational programs, and coordinate research in all aspects of soil and soil health. "The Soil Health Institute will be a permanent organization that will coordinate the long-term work needed in this area" said Neil Conklin, president, Farm Foundation.

The CPAC research sub-committee is very interested in soil health research and has funded projects studying biological alternatives for nematode control, cover crop research, and is now looking at additional projects. If you have ideas please contact Jim.

NPC

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has refused to consider requiring the labeling of biotech foods, affirming its longstanding policy that there's no reason for mandating such disclosure on products that are essentially the same as their conventional versions. The FDA rejected a petition by the Center for Food Safety asking for mandatory labeling of foods made with GMO's. Congress is currently negotiating a national, uniform labeling standard that brings transparency and consistency to the market place. But the current legislation has bogged down with Senator Debbie Stabenow (D-MI) seeking more transparency for consumers by possibly requiring disclosure through smartphone codes and on the Internet.

Last week congress passed H.R. 22, Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act. The bill will provide \$305 billion for improvements to U.S. roads and bridges. NPC believes that this will positively impact growers who rely on their produce arriving to its destination fresh and in a timely manner. The bill includes language authored by Rep. Dan Newhouse (R-WA) and supported by the potato industry requiring the Department of Transportation to collect data on

the cargo handling performance of ports. This data will allow a more rigorous evaluation of the possible impact of strikes and work slowdowns on port performance.

This bill also included language that specifically repealed previous crop insurance cuts that were passed earlier in the compromise budget bill. The budget agreement would have required the Agriculture Department to cap crop insurance companies' rate of return at 8.9 percent, down from the current 14.5 percent which would have resulted in higher premiums for farmers.
