RESEARCH

U.S. farmers and ranchers face a host of problems, from virulent diseases to antiquated manure-management strategies that could be solved or greatly curtailed by scientific innovation. However, the federal government has largely abandoned its role as a leading funder of agricultural research and development, writes Alan Leshner, CEO emeritus of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. And the consequences, he says, are only getting worse. Of the recently passed Farm Bill less than 1% of the funding is dedicated to agricultural research.

"In 1940, almost 40 percent of the federal investment in research and development was dedicated to the agricultural sciences," says Leshner. "Today, U.S. agricultural research funding represents less than 2 percent of the total." "The agriculture sector is critical to the overall U.S. economy, accounting for nearly \$1 trillion of our gross domestic product (GDP) and one in 10 jobs. <u>Agricultural research and development</u> funding has an estimated return on investment of 20 to 1, but the federal government's support for the scientific innovation has run dry, and our farmers have lost too much ground to overseas competitors." <u>More to the story here</u>

CPAC has been selected by CDA to submit two Specialty Crop Block Grants to USDA. The first grant involves working with the CSU Plant Diagnostic Clinic (PDC) and Dr. Mattupalli's plant pathology laboratory at the San Luis Valley Research Center to determine the capability of nanopore sequencing (single-molecule) technology to diagnose difficult plant and tuber disease samples as well as sequence important fungal pathogens that affect potatoes. The second project will utilize previous soil samples from our soil health project. These samples previously collected by Dr. Jahn and Dr. Stewart in 2016-2019 will be tested by Dr. Mattupalli using quantitative PCR (qPCR) to determine pathogen loads. This will allow

better estimation of the changes in pathogen pressure in response to the different rotational schemes used in the soil health project and create additional value to the soil health project.

CSU AG EXPERIMENT STATION EVENTS

We will be working with CSU and PCS to provide a PVY management workshop on Tuesday, June 11th. Guest speakers will include Stewart Gray from ARS-Cornell, Russ Groves from the University of Wisconsin, Nina Zidack from the Montana Seed Certification Service, and Amy Charkowski from CSU.

Field Day at the CSU research station is tentatively scheduled for June 19th. More details to come as the agenda develops.

NPC

Trade negotiations remain a top priority for the industry. One in every five rows of potatoes grown in the U.S is exported.

It appears that the negotiations with China are making rapid progress. Next week a Chinese trade delegation will be meeting in Washington to follow up on the meeting U.S. negotiators had in China on April 30th. The US potato industry has been seeking market access to China for fresh potatoes from the Pacific Northwest since July 2000. Since then, extensive discussions have been held and two visits by Chinese quarantine officials have taken place, most recently in July 2017.

While progress has been challenging thus far, it is hoped the current high-level talks between the US and China can lead to substantive developments on fresh potato market access. "Of all the trade disputes around the world, China is one where substantial gains can be made if the market access agreement is workable. Many of the other impacted markets will just involve us getting back to where we previously were. China could move us forward to a much better place in the final package," said John Keeling, NPC CEO.

Talks between the US and Japan continued last week as both sides look toward a prospective free trade agreement. On Friday, April 26th Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe and President Trump met in Washington, DC, and on Thursday US Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer met with Japanese Economy Minister Toshimitsu Motegi.

According to reports, the talks were positive and built upon previous discussions aimed at determining the scope of any US-Japan trade agreement. Enhancing market access for agricultural goods is a key objective of the administration, and key individuals within the White House have outlined a desire to secure more immediate concessions from Japan for US agricultural exports in some form. Trump and Abe will meet again in Japan May 25-28. The US potato industry has submitted formal comments to USTR requesting negotiators seek tariff concessions on US potato exports that, at a minimum, match those Japan has offered to other competitors such as Australia, Canada, New Zealand, and the European Union.
