RESEARCH NEWS

With specialty crop block grant funds from CDA, CPAC, and the CSU potato breeding program initiated **a new variety trial program** in 2022. The program is designed to compensate commercial and seed growers for trialing new unproven varieties. Growers are asked to plant a one-acre trial, provide agronomic field data on inputs and practices, participate in a field day evaluation with other growers, and cooperate in general. Grower cooperators receive free seed to plant and a \$500 payment once all the necessary data has been collected for the trial. AMY PARSONS NAMED NEW CSU PRESIDENT

The Colorado State University Board of Governors today confirmed Amy Parsons as the 16th president of CSU – the CSU System's flagship campus located in Fort Collins – effective Feb. 1, 2023, following a highly competitive, nationwide five-month search process.

"The Board of Governors is extremely confident in the leadership that Amy Parsons brings to the role of president," said Kim Jordan, chair of the CSU System Board of Governors. "Amy is a leader with proven results who brings a deep appreciation and respect for the university and its academic mission, as well as the business expertise needed to manage the complexity of an organization this size. Amy will surround herself with a strong team and is equipped to take care of the details that will allow everyone at the university to be able to focus on their areas of expertise and impact."

MEXICO TRADE UPDATE

Nora Gonzales, CPAC Mexico consultant, Ashley Warsh, and John Addison, marketing specialists with CDA, and Kam Quarles, NPC CEO, met with growers and shippers on December 5th to present the current trade status of exporting potatoes to Mexico. All indications are that trade to the interior is progressing without major impediments but slowly, mainly due to short domestic supplies.

Effective November 17, 2022, two additional points of entry were approved for fresh potato shipments to the interior of Mexico. Registered U.S. fresh potato exporters can now ship through Nuevo Laredo and Reynosa, Tamaulipas to the interior of Mexico. Both newly approved locations, located along the Mexico-Texas border, increase opportunities for U.S. exporters in the Midwest and the eastern United States. These point-of-entry approvals follow the operational work plan that was signed by the U.S. and Mexico. According to the work plan, four points of entry were initially approved, and SENASICA – the Mexican counterpart to USDA APHIS – will approve two additional points of entry annually. The six ports now open for fresh U.S. potato shipments include:

- Ciudad Juárez, Chihuahua
- Tijuana, Baja California
- Nogales, Sonora
- Mexicali, Baja California
- Nuevo Laredo, Tamaulipas
- Reynosa, Tamaulipas

NPC NEWS

Congress is still working to pass the 2023 appropriations spending bill on the Senate floor. It includes many important items for potato growers including an increase in funding for the NIFA potato breeding grant from \$3 M to \$4M. This money is shared through a competitive grant process by most of the potato breeding programs in the country. Funding for Agricultural Research will receive \$3.45 billion – \$175 million above the fiscal year 2022 enacted level. China has become the largest funder of agricultural R&D in the world, surpassing the United States and the European Union. They have been investing over \$10 B annually since 2015. The bill includes \$1.174 billion – \$61 million above the fiscal year 2022 enacted level – for the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service. This funding will support programs to help control or eradicate plant and animal pests and diseases that could potentially cripple U.S. agriculture, trade, and commerce. An example of this is potato wart and the emerging situation in Prince Edward Island that poses a serious threat to U.S. potato growers.
